

Could We Find You In An Emergency?



1. Post Your Address On Your Home

Your address should be posted on your home and visible from the road, and NOT just on your mailbox. Mailboxes help the Post Office deliver mail, but 9-1-1 needs to find you in an emergency!



Think like someone who has never been to your home and post the address somewhere obvious. A well marked location is much easier to find!

2. Make Sure Your Numbers Are Visible

Make sure that the numbers on your house are clear of any grass, bushes, or obstruction. Check that the numbers are not broken or faded.



Paint reflective numbers along your curb or place a light that shines directly on the numbers.



3. Check With Your Phone Company



Check your address with your telephone company if you have a landline phone. The phone company's listed address for you is what will display on the 9-1-1 center's equipment. It is very important that you make certain that your correct physical address is listed and not an old or incomplete address or a P.O. Box number. If calling from a cell phone, you will need to tell the dispatcher your location.

4. Report Missing Street Signs

Although many emergency responders know where most of the roads are located, a road sign can improve response time and ensure that responders have the correct location. If you notice your street's sign is missing or damaged, please report it to City Hall.
